
REOCEX the Lord is risen!

Kim Jin Yeop deported

Uniting Church missionary, Dr Kim Jin Yeop, was released from his Korean gaol and deported to Australia on 25 February. His mother flew from Los Angeles to meet him and was joined by a large crowd of Koreans at Sydney Airport. He thanked the many hundreds of Uniting Church people who wrote or sent cards, and included him in prayers while he was in prison.

Conversations with Muslims

On 9th March the Uniting Church's Assembly Working Group on Relations with other Faiths established their first official conversations with representatives of the Muslim faith. Major focus of the conversations was on community relationships within Australia.

Interns share their stories

A Woman of Egypt

by Jehan Sadat. Simon & Schuster Inc. New York > 1987

What a woman! Wife of President Anwar el-Sadat of Egypt who was assasinated for his efforts to bring Egypt out of its feudal past into modern democracy. Jehan Sadat is also a powerful personality in her own right. She shows those of us who would like to introduce social change - especially in relation to improving the position of women how to do it with tact, charm and yet total dedication.

Jehan speaks simply and sincerely of her marriage to Anwar Sadat and the reader is left in no doubt that it was a relationship of passion and mutual respect even though Sadat came from a traditional Muslim peasant background and held traditional Muslim views of women, at least at the start of his marriage to Jeh

at the start of his marriage to Jehan. Jehan, however, came from a privileged middle class background and right from her earliest years had strong ideas about social justice and improving the lot of women. In the book, we see how she handles the doubts and objections of her husband, finally bringing him around to her point of view while she accomplishes extraordinary changes in the lives on many Egyptian women.

We also gain a rich understanding of the nation of Egypt and the Middle East during the period of Jehan's life [she was born in 1933] and of Sadat's role in bringing about peace between Egypt and Israel. Thus, the book is very timely at this present period of history when the Gulf War is just over and

the Middle East and its political problems loom large on the world stage. From it we gain a comprehensive and easily digested understanding of Middle Eastern ways of thinking and the relationships the different middle eastern nations and their leaders have with each other. We get the inside story on personalities like Golda Meir, the Shah of Persia and his lovely wife, Farah Diba and Colonel Gadaffi of Libya because Jehan Sadat knew them all personally.

Finally, of particular interest to those who would know more about the faith of Islam and how it relates to Christianity and Judaism is Jehan Sadat's simple and straightforward

description not only of her own faith and what it means to her, but also her broad understanding of the meaning of Islam ["Islam" means submission; a Muslim is one who

submits]. She shows how the Koran keeps believers in strict submission where it is conservatively interpreted and how such an interpretation serves the purposes of men. But she also shows that when it is understood more liberally - which is the way she views it there is room for change. Her description of her pilgrimage to Mecca gives the reader an idea of the centrality of worship to the lives of Muslims and provides a stimulating contrast to the more inhibited forms of Western Christian worship that we are familiar with.

I can recommend this fascinating book without reservation to all who are interested in political history, comparative religion, feminism, romance and drama. Don't miss it!
